### Thanksgiving

November is a full month, churchly speaking. Usually by its end, we start a new church year on the first Sunday in Advent. This year that will be November 27. Thanksgiving is a welcome ing thanks. It is remarkable that the central sacraday of gathering and feasting, this year on November 24. This year the Ecumenical Thanksgiving Service will be at St. Richard's Catholic Church, just up Church Lane from us, at 7pm. Fr. Fernando Maldonado, the rector, Pastor Mateo Mamea, the new pastor of the Methodist Church and our own Fr. George Keith will be leading the service along with members of the Borrego Min-

isters Association, including Diane Johnson, cochair of the BMA with me. In a way, every Sunday is a thanksgiving, since Eucharist means givment of our faith, communion in the body and blood of the Lord, is called "Eucharist." If one listens carefully there is thanksgiving all through the service, in the Glory to God in the Highest, in the prayers of the People and in our exchanging peace with each other, in the Eucharistic Prayer led by the celebrant and in the sharing of the bread and cup. thankful and so much need the power of the Spirit given us each Sunday, to live out the Gospel the rest of the week.

At the start of the month come two days that remind us just how much we are connected to so many others. These are All Saints Day and All Souls Day, the latter also know as dia de los Muertos, the day of the dead. 

### **Veterans Day**

On Friday, November 11, we celebrate Veterans Day to honor all the men and women who have served in the Armed Forces. It began as a remembrance of the end of World War I in 1918, and was then called Armistice Day. It was renamed in 1954.

President Woodrow Wilson gave this address on November 11, 1919, in recognition of the first anniversary of the WWI armistice.

"A year ago today our enemies laid down their arms in accordance with an armistice which rendered them impotent to renew hostilities, and gave to the world an assured opportunity to reconstruct its shattered order and to work out in peace a new and juster set of international relations. The soldiers and people of the European Allies had fought and endured for more than four years to uphold the barrier of civilization against the aggressions of armed force. We ourselves had been in the conflict something more than a year and a half.

With splendid forgetfulness of mere personal concerns, we remodeled our industries, concentrated our financial resources, increased our agricultural output, and assembled a great army, so that at the last our power was a decisive factor in the victory. We were able to bring the vast resources, material and moral, of a great and free people to the assistance of our associates in Europe who had suffered and sacrificed without limit in the cause for which we fought.

Out of this victory there arose new possibilities of political freedom and economic concert. The war showed us the strength of great nations acting together for high purposes, and the victory of arms foretells the enduring conquests which can be made in peace when nations act justly and in furtherance of the common interests of men.

To us in America the reflections of Armistice Day will be filled with solemn pride in the heroism of those who died in the country's service, and with gratitude for the victory, both because of the thing from which it has freed us and because of the opportunity it has given America to show her sympathy with peace and justice in the councils of nations."

This year, as usual, the American Legion will present a Veterans Day ceremony at Christmas Circle, November 11 at 11:00 a.m. It is always very moving, and all are welcome to attend and join the Legion members afterwards at Post 853 for free hamburgers and hot dogs. And please take the time to thank a veteran for his or her service.

### **Vestry Meeting Summary**

**Thr Finance Committee:** September financials reviewed. As of September, pledge income exceeded pledges. Total expenses \$4,700 vs \$4,600 so in total things are being kept in line. \$5,500 operating surplus, mostly due to pledges paid in full in the beginning of the year. Bad news in September on investments...markets down and investments loss about \$40k. Cash still at \$32k.

**The Calling Committee:** Officially sent out the calling October 4th. As of October 17th, the download page had been visited 22 times.

**The Communications Committee:** Zoom Antenna bracket has arrived. Chuck will find someone to mount it. Expected to be done post-haste .Articles getting into paper for pet blessing and organist, Charles, arrival. Contact with BMA and new Methodist minister.

**The Building and Grounds Committee:** Smoke alarm replaced. Charles has proposed that middle level speaker of organ is not working as it should be. Originally installed late 90's. Technology has changed since then. Considering replace vs repair - most inexpensive is repair at \$1k

**Security Camera:** Cost as outlined previously - 160 degree view; 2 facing courtyard, one in front of church and 2 in back. Motion-activated. Works thru wifi. Can be cell-phone notified. Are battery powered and recharged via USB plug. Option for turning light on

**The Rectory Improvements:** Ugly fence at rectory. Suggestion to remove it. Stucco needs some desperate love. Garage door and 'gate to the front' need refreshing treatment of linseed oil and turpentine. Put in budget

**Brain Changes:** First meeting will be held on November 5 from 10:00 am to 1:00 pm in the Borrego Springs library. This will provide information and training for anyone in the community who is a care giver.
